Museum Notes

The Museum opens for the 2012 season on May 4th. It has been cleaned and various displays have been polished and updated. Special events for the summer include the Antiques Appraisal Clinic on May 5th sponsored by the Heritage Guild, Museum Tours for Society members on May 6th, during the August Dexter Daze a quilt show and a 'garage sale' on the Museum lawn (Any member who wishes may bring a table and set up their sale items. Please donate 10% of the day's sales to help the Museum.)

With the Pioneer Arts Fair being canceled due to the Dexter area tornado, expected Museum funds are diminished. At the same time, it is a priority that the Museum building and its historic elements be kept in repair. Anything you can do to help is appreciated. The

next big Museum project is renewing the protection of the historic stained glass windows. From the St. Andrew's United Church of Christ history book, we learn that the "plain glass windows in the church building were removed in the summer of 1915 and replaced with art glass windows donated in memory of departed loved ones and bearing their names." When visiting the main room of the Museum, you may read the family names on the windows--one of the nicest historic remnants of those families of early Dexter. Over 30 years ago, protective material was put over the windows on the outside to prevent breakage but, over the years, it has darkened and its protection against breakage most likely weakened, and it needs to be replaced. There is a new product that does not yellow over time, will give more light in the display room, and will greatly reveal the beauty of the windows. We are seeking estimates to remove the old material, do the necessary refurbishment of the window frames once they uncovered. install and the material. With the generous assistance of the Heritage Guild it is hoped the project can be done. This may be by doing the windows on one building wall at a time or all the windows at one time. If you are able to contribute to this special cause please send your donation to the Museum earmarked for window covering fund. As thank you, each donor name will be displayed appropriately in the Museum.

Voices of the Past: The Saga of Gordon Hall

James Baldwin Parker is a resident of Webster Township and author of three books on Webster Township families, as well as one on Webster Church. He is now working on a new book titled above. He has done extensive research at the Bentley Library, in the files here at the Museum and has interviewed various persons at the University of Michigan or other local experts on Gordon Hall and the Dexter Family. Norma McAllister's book on Judge Samuel William Dexter has been quoted, with her permission, and Frank Wilhelm has added his expertise on the Dexter Family. Through the pages of the book, we learn the history of the Dexter Family and the three houses built for Judge Dexter, but he concentrates on Gordon Hall through its different owners from 1840 to 2011. Plans are to publish the book this spring or early summer through Thompson-Shore here in Dexter.

We are hoping to purchase a quantity of the books at cost that we will then sell at \$25 each, with the proceeds going to the Gordon Hall Fund. We are seeking donations to enable us to purchase sufficient books to sell at our various events as well as through the Museum Gift Shop. Donations should be made to the "Dexter Area Historical Society and Museum" (a nonprofit organization) so that you will be able to use it as a deduction on your taxes. Civil War Days at Gordon Hall

In commemoration of the Civil War's 150th anniversary, the DAHS&M will present **Civil War Days at Gordon Hall** on Friday - Sunday, June 8th - 10th.

On Friday evening there will be a free concert performed by a local band on the front lawn of Gordon Hall. Please bring blankets and chairs for seating. The group will wear period dress, and perform 1860's music. The St. Patrick's Boychoir, a group returning by popular demand, will join them. A historical narrative will accompany the music.

Saturday and Sunday the military and civilian encampments will be open for visits. In addition to the troops, there will be quartermaster's wagons and artillery firings. This year there will be a Confederate representation with a visit from Confederate artillery. Activities in civilian camp and around Gordon Hall will include the demonstrations. children's games, storytelling and a scavenger hunt. The reading of the "roll" of local GAR soldiers will take place both days. Sons of Union Veterans members will assist families researching their connections to Civil War soldiers.

Saturday includes living historians, minstrel music, a poet/bard, a bones workshop and a period fashion review and tea. Available lunch and supper reflect period fare. President and Mrs. Lincoln will arrive, coming through town via horse and carriage, where from the front porch of Gordon Hall he will address the crowd, bringing greetings from Washington and posing for photos with guests.

Sunday begins with a morning service at Forest Lawn cemetery. This is followed by a gospel sing back on the lawn of Gordon Hall. Activities of the day include a pie auction, a pig roast, an old time base ball game and horseshoe contest. The day will conclude with announcing contest winners and a mock mortgage burning.

1862 "Experience" – An Evening with President and Mrs. Lincoln

The fundraising dinner will take place on Saturday, June 9th. This experience will include: A Period Quintet, Conversation with the President and First Lady, An 1862 White House Menu, Lantern Tours of Military and Civilian Encampments and an Evening Farewell. Tickets, \$125 per guest must be purchased in advance.
