# Museum Opens May 4th with "Wedding Dress Collection"



The Dexter Area Museum will open for the season on May 4th, 2018 featuring a collection of wedding attire donated by local persons. Our collection spans the years from 1865 to 1965. Our most complete wedding attire is from 1890: the wedding gown of Hattie Phelps and the groom's attire of Burt Kenny.

Wedding dress or gown styles have changed through the years. In Western cultures, the bride often chose a white wedding dress, which was made popular by Queen Victoria. After the turn of the century, wedding dresses often reflected the fashions of the day. This continued until the late 1960's when it became popular to revert to long, full-skirted designs reminiscent of the Victorian era.

#### **Obed Taylor's House**

Until last fall, the Cobblestone House, located at the corner of Baker and Shield, had long been a historic landmark in Dexter. Casual observers may have noticed that it had not been occupied for years, obvious by the fact that its windows and doors were boarded up. Its walls were crumbling, and the South wall bowed precariously outward, revealing a gap of several feet between the walls at the back of the house. The original mortise and tenon joint on the Southwest corner had come completely uncoupled, exposing the interior to the elements and

pulling the structure slowly towards the ground. It was no longer safe to be used for housing. Its current owners took a careful look at the possibility of restoring it, but to no avail. There was no hope for the crumbling structure and they disassembled it last fall, saving what they could of the original house.

The house was built sometime in the 1840s, making it one of the earliest homes in the area. Its builder, a Massachusetts farmer named Obed Taylor, was given forty acres in exchange for digging out a mill race on Mill Creek for Vrelon Bates. Bates was one of the founding settlers in the area. Taylor dug the mill race by hand, which took two years.

The house was in the Greek Revival style, which is a common house type in this area (although **cobblestone** houses of this type are very rare). Greek Revival features

include a symmetrical shape, pilasters, columns on some styles, a porch entry, and plain or highly decorated cornices and friezes. Chimneys were placed as far back as possible to make the home look more like a Greek temple. Most houses of this style are considered "gable fronters," meaning the gable end faces front rather than to the side.

Though the foundation was built of fieldstone, the exterior walls were cobblestones picked up along the waters of Mill Creek and its surrounding fields. Cobblestones are typically the size of one's hand and are smoothed and rounded by water. Cobbles were laid in rows, called "courses," sometimes using multicolored

stones to form a pattern. The cobbles were mortared together with quicklime, made from burning limestone from the creek in a kiln and mixing the ash with water.

Most of the walls were still stuck together with the original mortar from the 1840s, first put up over 175 years ago!

The mill, first a sawmill and later a flour mill, was at the intersection of Shield Rd. and Mill Creek itself. The public sidewalk from Dexter High School to Shield passes in front

of the embankment that formed the mill pond. The The stone from this mill, embankment still exists. scored with use, is now displayed outside the Dexter Area Museum.

Time and the elements finally caught up with Obed Taylor's house and Dexter lost a unique landmark. Time marches on with the impending 2018 construction of a roundabout at that corner. As you whiz by on your way in or out of town, try to imagine Obed Taylor building the house, stone by stone, 175 years ago.
