2024 Gordon Hall Raffle

To celebrate Dexter's 150th birthday in 1974, the people of Dexter filled a Sesquicentennial time capsule and buried it at the Dexter Area Museum. On May 18 at 1:00 pm, we will dig it up and get a first glimpse at what is in there. After a brief viewing, the capsule will be moved to another location while we sort through and clean the contents. Guidelines for Donations to Dexter's Bicentennial Time Capsule

To celebrate Dexter's 200th birthday, we will fill our Bicentennial time capsule. From May 31 to June 19, the Dexter Area Historical Society will accept donations of items to be placed in the Dexter Bicentennial time capsule. Visit the Museum on May 31, June 1, 7, 8,14 & 15 from 1-3 pm or June 16, 17, and 19 from 5-7 pm. Deadline for contributions is June 19 at 7 pm.

On June 21, these items will be buried in a vault at the Dexter Area Museum and they will not be seen again until 2074, when the vault is dug up. If you would like to contribute items to the time capsule, consider these guidelines:

- Maximum size about 18 x 18 inches
- No liquids, food, hazardous materials (eg, batteries, aerosols, chemicals, gases, anything flammable or corrosive)
- No portable electronic devices with batteries



We are celebrating our 200 years of Dexter with some facts that we have found, but not shared in previous writings, including the Bicentennial Book, "Dexter Then and Now, Celebrating 200 years". In doing so, we will skip over those facts previously presented, with only slight mention of them when needed for continuity. We have divided the 200 years into 50 year blocks.

1874 to 1924 - The Second 50

At the end of the last article, the LONG DEPRESSION had begun in 1873 and lasted until 1879. During these years, 18,000 businesses went bankrupt, including 89 railroads. This even occurred though the SECOND INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION (1870 to 1914) was happening. Like the first industrial revolution (1770s to 1850s), it continued the transition from creating goods by hand, to using machines, and offered more industrialization, scientific industry, and mass production. Three of the major inventions of the 1870s include the telephone, electric lights and the typewriter.

During the 1880s, Americans experienced exceptional industrial development and economic growth. Railroads became more prevalent throughout the country allowing faster and more convenient means of travel. The depression of 1882 to 1885 was an economic downturn that came about gradually. It was preceded by a period of prosperity over the years 1879 to 1882, powered by the expansion of the American railroad industry and the opening of economic opportunities associated with the development of the transportation system. During this

time, annual railroad construction quadrupled growing from 2665 miles in 1878 to 11,569 miles in 1882. The expansion represented a full 15% of American capital formation during the decade



Locally, John Bross, a boat builder, received a patent for oar tips, a way of



protecting the edges of oars. He is pictured here in one of his smaller boats on a local lake. But

he constructed boats of all sizes in his office in the old wooden row on North Main St., until he moved into a barn located behind his Baker Street home.

The GAY NINETIES is an American term referring to the decade of 1890s. One of the highlights was the witty plays of Oscar Wilde. In the midst of the era, the PANIC OF 1893, a widespread economic depression in the United States was set off and lasted until 1897.

Beginning in 1896, the PROGRESSIVE ERA led to social activism, and political reform across the country that focused on defeating corruption, monopoly, waste, and inefficiency. This ended when the United States declared war on the German empire on April 6, 1917, nearly 3 years after World War I had started. A cease-fire and armistice were declared on November 11, 1918.

The world was changing, and some of our Dexter boys and girls moved to Detroit to work in the jobs created in the new industrial age. A prime example is William Yates Arnold, known as Will. He is pictured here with his brother, Ralph Arnold in about 1885. Their father, William Henry Arnold had purchased and/or inherited a large amount of farmland, which he continued to farm with the help of his sons.

The brothers married the daughters of Rha and Phoebe Burkhart Johnson, Ralph to Artena in 1893 and Will to Olie in 1894. After their marriage, Ralph and Artena settled in on the Johnson farm, but Will and Olie decided to go to Detroit because he wanted to work on the railroad.

By April of 1899, William Henry Arnold and his wife, Elizabeth Dancer moved to Detroit to live with their son Will. This caused a major change in the Dexter and Lima Township farming communities. This clipping shows how his move affected the agricultural community.

April 20, 1899 - Dexter Leader!

Lots of Moving.

Within three miles of the north, east and south sides of Four-mile lake, fourteen farmers are making changes as follows: Wm. Arnold goes to Detroit; Ralph Arnold from Mrs. Johnson's farm to Wm. Arnold's; G. Helber from Elmer Beach's to Mrs. Johnson's; Henry Hudson to Elmer Beach's; Charles Fisk to Mrs. Cooper's; Frank Nixon from Mrs. Cooper's to north of Dexter: J Nixon from R. Buchanan's to east of Ann Arbor; E. Wilde to R. Buchanan's; A. C. Yereance from G. Yereance's to Alonzo Davis'; H. Neeb to G. Yereance's; E. Gentner to H. Baldwin's, A. Spiegelberg from Ohio to his own farm: J. Lucht from Pierce farm; W. Coe from New York to Pierce farm.

Two cyclones occurred in the Dexter area that are documented in the Dexter Leader. The first In the July 2, 1914 paper, the headline read:

"Cyclone in Dexter Township" "Several People Injured, Houses and Barns Destroyed, Heavy Damage Done to Orchards, Crops and Timber."

This cyclone was first noted in Eaton, then Ingham and Livingston counties before moving into Washtenaw County at Big Silver Lake, and from there to Birkett (Dover), leaving a path marked with ruin and destruction. Although there were no deaths Mrs. William Eisle was critically injured, but did survive, as did others with various injuries.

The second cyclone was reported in the June 7, 1917 Dexter Leader in both Lima and Scio Townships. It struck the line of the electric



railway near the Parker schoolhouse and destroyed the buildings on the Sias, Clements and Parker Farms

among others.

In the June 14 paper, Salem, Freedom, and Northfield were added to the list of other townships hit by the same storm. There were two deaths. Ortie Heselschwerdt, a 17-year-old helping to bale hay on the Sias farm, and the eight month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Rentschler of Salem Township.

Even as the United States was entering the war effort, the nation and the whole world was being invaded by a silent killer, often called erroneously the "Spanish influenza." This misnomer occurred as Spain was not involved in the war, and thus readily reported its flu deaths, while the other countries held back that information from their enemies! In the Dexter area, there are few actual reports on the flu. Two Dexter boys died at Camp Custer of pneumonia, following the Spanish influenza. Private Clay Arksey on October 17, 1918 and Private George Belfanz on October 16, 1918. Both had been home on leave and left for Camp Custer in the summer. Although they didn't get to the battlefront, they made the supreme sacrifice in the service of their country.

The Temperance movement led to the passage of the 18th Amendment and the PROHIBITION ERA (1920 to 1933). The United States prohibited the production, importation, transportation and sale of alcoholic beverages. The 19th Amendment gave white women the right to vote, but that wasn't the case for many women of color.

August 1921 to August 1929 - THE ROARING TWENTIES! As returning soldiers re-entered the labor force, there was a boom in construction, and the automobile, radio, film and other industries grew. It was a period of economic prosperity with a distinctive, cultural edge in the United States and Europe.

We are in a time of contradictions which ends abruptly with the Great Depression and the many changes that occur as we head towards World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War.


